




Capital Projects By Todd Schuh

We have snow! In other news, it has been a normal start to our winter here in Snowline.

- We thankfully did not have the heavy rains that caused flooding issues like last year. Working with owners in the affected area on St. Helens Place, we have agreed on a temporary solution and accumulated all the parts to deal with the flooding problems when the heavy rains do return.
- The Christmas lights are up and they are beautiful. Thank you to Chuck and Evan for your hard work and dedication to make Snowline sparkle for the holidays.
- We had a significant wind event in November that brought down around six major trees. Unfortunately, a few homes were damaged and required almost a week to clean up.
- We had our first snowfall a couple weeks ago and continued cold temperatures have caused that snow to linger.

Snowline snowplowing guidelines:

- The first plow occurs when two to three inches of snow have accumulated.
- Sanding will follow as soon as possible after plowing, but only if the snow has stopped falling.
- We aim to plow the road edge in front of every driveway if time allows.
- We do not plow individual driveways. It beats up our equipment and mostly takes time away from all the other tasks that are pushed to the forefront when it snows in Snowline.
- Reminder to park away from road edges, especially during a snowstorm. Our plow needs an additional couple of feet from the edge to pack the removed snow.
 We appreciate your cooperation.

Make sure you and your guests are adhering to the 15 MPH speed limit. This is important for pedestrian safety, particularly with the winter road conditions. Also, remember roadside parking is prohibited, as it may interfere with snow removal.
